




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Urogynecology Subspecialty Graduation

It is the first of its kind in Ethiopia and is accredited through Mekelle University.

Urogynecology, also known as Female Pelvic Medicine and Reconstructive Surgery, is a specialty focused on the care of women with pelvic floor dysfunction such as incontinence (urinary and fecal leakage), prolapse (bulging or falling of the vaginal tissues), and pelvic pain.

HCM to Start Ultrasound Services in Rural Clinics

Hamlin College of Midwives (HCM) provided a 10-week intensive ultrasound training to a total of 10 trainees, drawn from mentors, midwives and instructors, with the mission of launching ultrasound services in its Hamlin supported government rural clinics.

"The training, provided in consultation with the Radiological Society of Ethiopia and Addis Ababa University, is part of the College's effort in improving the quality of care for pregnant mothers in supported rural clinics Hamlin throughout Ethiopia," said Ato Zelalem Belete, Dean of the College and Hamlin Prevention Manager, "Ultrasound can save the lives of mothers and babies. We are now able to deliver a training that will bring lifesaving antenatal point of care ultrasound services within easier reach for rural communities. The lack of midwives, who are trained to perform antenatal ultrasounds, as well as a lack of equipment, is a widespread problem putting lives at risk," he added.

The training, which incorporated both theory and practice, will

enable Hamlin midwives to identify pregnancy related abnormalities as early as possible and contribute to preventing obstetric fistula and maternal morbidity and mortality in general.

Following the completion of the training, five portable ultrasound machines with rechargeable batteries will be made available in Hamlin supported government clinics. The cost of the training, including the purchase of ultrasound machines, is fully funded by Catherine Hamlin Fistula Foundation, the Australian aged and leading partner organization in supporting the whole works of HFE.

Ultrasound scans during pregnancy are considered to provide vital information for a pregnant woman and the health professional, such as an estimated due date for the baby, which can be crucial in diagnosing complications.



Quarter III Review Meeting

The Youngest Hamlin Outreach Center



Hamlin Fistula Ethiopia (HFE) has a long history of excellence in providing free and holistic services for thousands of Ethiopian poor rural women with obstetric fistula. Over half of the services have been managed through, the used to be one and only, Addis Ababa Fistula Hospital based in the capital city, Addis Ababa.

Before the establishment of Hamlin outreach centers, fistula patients from different corners of the country had to travel long to Addis Ababa, which was costly and above all required someone, with experience, to accompany. Those who did not manage to travel had to stay with fistula for additional years, even after they heard of the hospital and its free services.

15 years back Hamlin took the commitment to resolve such a challenge through strategically building outreach

treatment centers in the four directions. The plan was successfully realized with the Bahir Dar and Mekele centers in the North, Yirgalem in the South, Harar in the East and Mettu in the South West.

Mettu Hamlin Fistula Center, with almost 8 years of service, is the youngest of all. It is sited in South West Ethiopia, Oromiya Region, Illu Ababora Zone Administration, Mettu town. Following its construction in the premises of Mettu Karl Government Hospital, the center started fully functioning in September 2010.

The center has one horizontally built building, which incorporates a clean ward of 40 beds, Operations Theater, OPD and offices, and a beautiful garden full of flowers and banana plants. Every day after lunch, it is common to see staff and fistula survivors sitting and drinking coffee together under the trees.

According to Ato Tibebu Abate, the center's Manager, the catchment population that the center is expected to serve is about 13 million and over the past 8 years close to 15 hundreds fistula patients have received successful surgeries. In addition to the treatment, the center has been providing ambulance and mentoring services for Hamlin supported government health centers, now reached 14, under its supervision.

Shining Back: A Rebirth from Years of Agonizing Life

Her name is Tsehaynesh, shortened simply Tsehay, which means the 'Sun'. But Tsehay's real life was not as bright as the Sun. She, now 20, grew up in a remote village in Benishangul-Gumuz region and faced with many life challenges during her teenage. She dropped out of school, unwillingly married at 13, lost her first child at 15, became a victim of fistula, and subsequently led an agonizing life....

"It was not my wish to discontinue my education and get married, but my family wanted. I had to abide by my family's rules. In our community, a man requesting a woman for marriage should pay 4 thousand birr and present 4 cows to her family. My family, therefore, was attracted to this present, and I got married at 13 to a man much older than me," she recalls.

At 15, Tsehay conceived, and it was happy news for the families on both sides. The happiness, however, short-lived, only for nine months. The four day painful labor at her mother's home was unsuccessful, and Tsehay was carried on a handmade stretcher towards the closest government clinic, 5 hours walk distance.



As time was already over for Tsehay to be treated at the clinic, she was referred to the closest government hospital in ambulance lying between death and life. On the fifth day, she was made to give a stillbirth through surgery, and luckily she stayed alive but left under a condition she had never heard of--double fistula

Knowing nothing to do about it, Tsehay was discharged from the hospital and went back home. "It was unbearable. I was spending the whole day lying on a soaked bed. Because of the stench, no one wanted to get close to me even my own brothers. I stayed in such agony for three years," she remembers.

In those three years, it was her mother and older sisters who took care of her. Her husband disappeared after a while and he never returned home ever since. Three years later, Tsehay heard of our hospital from a priest at the closest church who incidentally appeared to see her condition.

With the support of the church and the nearby government hospital, she arrived at Mettu Fistula Center two years ago. Given her five days long labor and three years stay without treatment, she was totally losing control of her body. "The moment I saw other women with the same problem at Mettu I became hopeful. I want to thank the staff at Mettu center for their unconditional love and care," Tsehay says.

Almost a year ago, Tsehay arrived at our Addis Ababa main hospital and stayed under different levels of treatment. The final complex surgery she received in February 2018 totally cured her. She is now receiving rehabilitation training at Desta Mender, which incorporates life and business skills, and counseling.

Tigist, our learning coordinator, has been closely following Tsehay's condition, and says, "Tsehay is one of the few uniquely talented fistula survivors I have met. She is very passionate to learn more every day and is one of the best handicraft makers. After the successful surgery, her behavior has totally changed and she is so much happier now."
